INTRODUCTION

"AVE MARIA" is the official religious recognition program of the Catholic Committee on Scouting, Archdiocese of Santa Fe, designed for Second and Third Grade students. The program is designed to enable young girls, who are registered Girl Scouts, Camp Fire Girls, etc., to learn more about their faith.

The purpose of this award is to help the young girl become aware of herself, her neighbor, and her own relationship with God.

The primary purpose of the program is to serve girls of the Catholic faith, but if a non-Catholic desires to participate, she may do so with the permission of her parents. A most important dimension in the "AVE MARIA" award program is the guidance and help of her parents/guardians.

When the child has completed the book, please complete the Application Form, which appears at the end of the workbook, and send the entire workbook and fees to the Catholic Committee on Scouting by **APRIL 1**. The Ave Maria Medal is then presented to the children who have successfully completed the program as a reminder of their experience.

PART 1. BE A DISCOVERER

1. Read this story or the full version in the Bible (Genesis 1:1-2:2).

The Story of Creation

In the beginning, God spoke into the darkness. God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. God saw how good the light was. Then God made the sky. God gathered up the waters below the sky into seas and oceans. Dry land appeared. God called the dry land "earth". And God was pleased. Then God said, "Let the earth bring forth plants and flowers and trees." And the earth was filled with life and colors, with fruits and grains. God saw how good it was. Then God set the sun in the sky to give light by day, and the moon and the stars to shine upon night. Again, He saw how good it was. Then God said, "let the waters be filled with creatures, and let birds fly in the sky." And so there were fish and birds of all kinds. God looked at them with pleasure and blessed them all. Then God said, "Let the earth be filled with every kind of animal." Then animals, both wild and tame, large and small, began to move over the earth. And God saw how good it was. Finally, God said, "Let us make human beings in our own image and likeness to rule over the earth, the skies, and the seas." So He made man and woman who were made in the very image of God. God blessed the woman and man and told them, "Have children who will live all over the earth. I am giving you and your children the whole world to care for, to use, and to enjoy." God looked at everything. He saw that it was all very good. So God rested from all the work he had done. (Based on Genesis 1:1-2:2)

Understanding the Message

The Bible tells us that God creates everything and makes people in God's own image. All that God creates is good. The world is God's gift to us. God gave us the world to enjoy, to care for, and to use with respect. We are responsible for all living beings and our environment. God's presence and goodness are all around us and within us. Christians call God's loving presence in our lives *grace*.

Now that you have read the Story of Creation, write below some of the ways God has blessed you. Then color the picture on the next page. Optional activity : Take a walk around your neighborhood. See how many things you can list in 5 minutes that were created by God, not human beings (Example: clouds, grass, birds, air, etc.)		

2. With your parents, make a list of religious articles in your home and their locations. (Be sure to include the location of the family Bible, crosses or crucifixes, your rosary beads, your baptismal certificate, picture books about the saints, and other important religious items. See if you can locate a religious article in every room of the house.)		

3. Have an adult give you a tour of your church or a shrine. Make sure they explain things that you don't know about. Write about <u>one</u> thing you talked about or learned from the tour. Optional activity : Visit another Catholic church or parish than you usually attend. See if you can locate similar items found in your own parish. See if you can collect a parish bulletin as a souvenir from your visit to another parish.

PART 4. BE A FRIEND MAKER

1. With your parents read these stories of the lives of Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton, Saint Cecilia, and Saint Frances of Rome. Then color the pictures of each saint

SAINT ELIZABTH ANN SETON (January 4)

Born in New York City, August 28, 1774, Elizabeth lost her mother early, and her education became the concern of her father.

At nineteen, Elizabeth married William Magee Seton of New York. Five children were born of their happy union. After her husband's death, the Filicchi, life-long friends, welcomed the grieving widow to their home in Italy.

Elizabeth returned to New York in 1804 and entered the Catholic Church on March 14, 1805. She accepted an invitation from Archbishop Carroll to establish a girls school in Baltimore. Several women joined her in religious life, and she became known as "Mother Seton". They were known as Sisters of Charity and lived in Emmitsburg.

A school, opened for the children of the parish, was the first parochial school in the United States. Elizabeth died on January 4, 1821. In 1963, she became the first American-born citizen to be beatified and on September 14, 1975, she was canonized by Pope Paul VI.

SAINT CECILIA (November 22)

Cecilia was a member of a noble family of Rome and a follower of Christ. Her parents forced her to marry a nobleman named Valerian. In the evening of her wedding day, with the music of the marriage feast ringing in her ears, Cecilia renewed the vow by which she consecrated her virginity to God. "Pure be my heart and undefiled my body; for I have a spouse you do not know, an angel of my Lord." This is why she is honored as a patron of music.

Cecilia converted her husband to the Faith of Christ. Because he helped Cecilia in her charity toward the poor, he was put to death. Cecilia refused to sacrifice to the gods. The judge condemned her to be smothered by steam. But God protected Cecilia. Then the judge ordered a soldier to kill her with a sword. He struck her three times, but did not cut off her head. She fell down, badly wounded, and for three days she remained alive. She gave her property to the holy Bishop Urban for the use of the Church, and received the sacrament of Holy Communion before she died. This happened in 117.

Cecilia was buried in the catacombs. Her grave was discovered in 817, and her body was placed in the church of St. Cecilia of Rome. In 1599, when her tomb was opened her body was incorrupt.

SAINT FRANCES OF ROME (MARCH 9)

St. Frances of Rome had a youthful desire to enter religion, but at her father's wish she married, at the age of twelve, Lorenzo de' Ponziani. She won away many Roman ladies from a life of frivolity, and united them in an association of oblates attached to the White Benedictine monastery of Santa Maria Nuova; later they became the Benedictine Oblate Congregation of Tor di Specchi. Its members led the life of religious, but without the strict cloister or formal vows, and gave themselves up to prayer and good works. With her husband's consent Frances practiced continency, and advanced in a life of contemplation. Her visions often assumed the form of drama enacted for her by heavenly personages. She had the gift of miracles and ecstacy, we well as the bodily vision of her guardian angel, had revelations concerning purgatory and hell, and foretold the ending of the Western Schism. She could read the secrets of consciences and detect plots of diabolical origin. She was remarkable for her humility and detachment, her obedience and patience, exemplified on the occasion of her husband's banishment.

On the death of her husband, she retired among her oblates at Tor di Specchi, seeking admission for charity's sake, and was made superior. On the occasion of a visit to her son, she fell ill and died on the day she had foretold.



3. The Rosary is one of the best prayers we have. Its origin is traditionally connected with St. Dominic in Spain in the 13th century. One day, the Blessed Virgin appeared to him holding a Rosary in her hand. She told him that the Rosary was a precious gift which she would leave and would obtain graces from God and help sinners to change.

Later, in 1858, Mary appeared 18 times to St. Bernadette at Lourdes, in France. A white Rosary hung from her arm. She was the Immaculate Conception.

On May 13, 1917, the Blessed Virgin appeared to 3 shepherd children at Fatima, in Portugal. Again, the white rosary hung from her hand. She asked them to return on the 13th day of each month until October. On October 13, she told the children she was the "Lady of the Rosary" and said that people must pray the rosary.

The Rosary is a special way of praying to God that honors Mary, the Mother of Jesus. The Rosary calls to mind the most important events in the lives of Jesus and Mary. Pray the Rosary with your parents. These events are called Mysteries and are divided into four groups. They are:


